"Differences should be celebrated," said Eric Stonestreet. Stonestreet portrays a gay man on the show Modern Family. His character, Cam, is married to Mitchell (Jesse Tyler Ferguson). Their characters give good insight on the life of a gay married couple.

All of the time, people continuously say to be different, and to be original. But in some cases, being different isn't celebrated as much. For Lesbian, Gav. Bisexual, and Transgender (LGBT) youth, coming out can be the scariest thing they have ever done.

Memoirist Dan Savage and his husband Terry Miller started the *It Gets* Better campaign in hopes of making an impact on the teenage LGBT population. This project was inspired by a thread of teen suicides, like 15-year old Billy Lucas, who took his life because classmates had been bullying him due to his sexual orienta-

"One hundred videos. That was the goal, and it seemed ambitious; one hundred videos-best-case scenario: two hundred videosmade by lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender adults for lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender youth," said Savage in the introduction of his book, It Gets Bet-

The point of the website is to collect encouraging videos for LGBT teens to help them get through the hard times as a teen. Savage really wants to help the LGBT youth feel more comfortable about coming out. He wants to assure to them that it really does get better. No matter how hard it is now, it does get better in time.

These LGBT kids are often scared to come out about being different, and they have a reason to be scared. The bullying that goes on these days is unbelievable. Students are so harsh.

In the case of Billy Lucas, one of his friends said that she actually heard people tell him to "go kill himself." (Teen suicide victim hangs himself from barn rafters)

"Now we've got to dispel this myth that bullying is just a normal rite of passage, that it's some inevitable part of growing up," said Barack Obama in his entry for It GetsBetter.

One young man posted a video on the It Gets Better website of him calling his

dad and telling him that he is gay.

"Promise you will love me as long as you live," the son kept saying.

After he told his dad he was gay, his dad was eerily silent.

"I still love you, son," his dad replied.

In some cases, these teens have the support of their friends and family, but some don't. There are families that aren't accepting of their child's sexual orientation and they push them away. This project was designed to help the kids going through a hard time in their life.

What is it like to be a gay student at Freeman High School?

"To be openly gay at Freeman is hard because a lot of people think differently about it and sometimes try to harass me, but the bad comments that I get don't hurt me because I am proud to be gay," said junior Zach Werner.

Werner knew that he is gay when he was younger.

"Telling people about being gay is really hard because you don't know how they are going to react," Werner explained. "I've lost a lot of friends because I told them I was gay. My parents took the news



pretty well and they said that they would support me no matter what decision I make."

Werner said that the support from his friends and family have made him more open about it. The biggest challenge he has faced is telling family and friends.

"Not a lot of people know about it just because I worry about being harassed on a daily basis," Werner added. "Most people appreciate and accept it, but some hate it and continue to harass me about it."

Hopefully the efforts of adult role models like Savage, Miller, and the thousands of others that have spoken up through the It Gets Better project will help to influence and support other LGBT teens to be open and not ashamed.

Running Start, is it the right choice for you?

Have you ever wished vou could skip a grade, or two? Well, Running Start can't help you now but it can help you when you get into college.

Running Start allows juniors and seniors into college courses which will help them meet college requirements that a sophomore or junior in college would have. This would allow the student to jump straight into their junior or sophomore year.

Sounds great doesn't it? Sadly, there are drawbacks. If you fail your classes, your parents are forced to pay for the education, you lose credits (college and high school),

and it greatly affects Freeman School District financially. So students interested in Running Start must have a lot of maturity and self-dedication.

"In the first five years that I was here, we had more students not graduate because of Running Start than anything else," said Hamma. "It takes a very active learner that can synthesize different information."

This program allows students to take a college classes on a college campus in order to earn college credits at a rate of one high school credit for every five quarter credit hours successfully completed by the student (OSPI). You must also continue to take classes

that will grant you the credits needed to graduate Freeman High school. If you need two math classes then you will end up taking two math classes at a college level. However, English classes are different as the college separates English classes so one covers literature and the other covers writing, requiring you to take two English classes to equal one high school English, and your quarter credit hours will benefit you as they will help you progress towards having the qualifications of a sophomore or even a junior upon entering college.

"I will have 45 quarter credit hours by the end of this year, which is just shy of my junior requirements

for college," said junior Taylar Franz, who is currently enrolled in Running Start.

If you are interested in doing Running Start, you need to meet the following requirements: be a junior or senior, pass a college placement test (COMPASS, AS-SET, or ACCUPLACER), and be accepted for admission to the Running Start program. In order to do this, the student will need to meet with Hamma to go through the process.

According to nsd.org, the student must have minimum of 10 credits from Freeman High School. Although you should consider and talk to your parents and Hamma about whether or not you are prepared for Running Start.

Spokane's Bloomsday is one of the largest road races in the United States. With over 50,000 participants every year, it is almost impossible to find someone that hasn't heard of the run.

Bloomsday was started in 1997 by Don Kardong, who wanted to show off Spokane's downtown area after the 1974 World Fair. Bloomsday's first sponsor was Premera, and people also volunteered to help out with the race, such as handing out shirts and water. Bloomsday is now featured on ESPN, Fox Sports Northwest, and Outdoor Life Network.

"I started running Bloomsday in 1982," said math and science teacher Mike Allen, an avid runner. "I think, and have run it eight times because I took a few years off over the last 30."

Bloomsday's course stretches over 7 miles, includ-

ing a lengthy uphill climb on Doomsday Hill.

This year's Bloomsday had a total of over 5,500 registered runners, with over 5,200 finishers.

With over 50,000 participants a year, the Bloomsday volunteers had trouble recording everyone's times accu-

rately, until 2006 when the use of transponder chips greatly helped record everyone's times and also make their times available online.

"I always try to beat my old time, and have ran the race since 5^{th} grade," Mitchell said.

Many families choose to run the race together, as well as friends. Allen chooses to run by himself, however.

"I run by myself, and find any family afterward," Allen explained. "We do a big lunch together."

What was the worst part about this Bloomsday?

"Not being in second seed section," Allen answered. "Three seconds faster 5k next year!"

Mitchell thinks that the hardest part is the beginning, because "you know you have a long ways to go."

APX Strengthens Freeman

"Building athletes, breeding champions" is the motto for APX Strength, Freeman's summer weight lifting program. APX is a Pacific Northwest-based company which specializes in helping athletes be the best they can be with strength training programs and camps.

One of these programs is here at Freeman during the summer. Although open to all high school students including upcoming freshmen, the program is mostly used by the football team to prepare for the upcoming season. APX is run in Freeman's weight room.

"We first found out about APX through Paul Sorenson, and then heard more about it from Avery Smetana and Justin Barrong," said head football coach Jim Wood.

Smetana and Barrong shared their opinions from their experience with APX when lifting with the West Valley players, which helped get Wood on board with APX.

"The success was so overwhelming in terms of how many kids were showing up each day, and the transformation of the bodies taking place over the summer, that we decided to make it a main part of the summer lifting program last year," receivers coach Jim Phinney explained.

So many players were signing up for the summer lifting program that there were up to

six kids per weight rack. Coaches were also starting to notice players filling out and having more endurance on the field.

"I feel like that as soon as we started APX in the summer, it made us a better football team," said freshman Markus Goldbach.

Goldbach started APX when he was a 7th grader and trained with the middle school program in the first year APX was offered in the summer.

"APX also was really great for team building, and we became a closer team because of it," Goldbach added.

What is the greatest part about APX?

"In my opinion, the greatest part of APX is the team concept to dedicating themselves to be better not only as an individual, but as a team," Phinney explained.

Players think they are participating in APX to focus on building themselves, but a larger part is that the team becomes stronger as a whole.

"I have seen many of our athletes, as well as non-athletes that are in my class, get much bigger through the year," said head baseball coach Chad Ripke. "I see some much broader shoulders. Some kids with much toner bodies."

APX Strength is headed by Director Drew Buchkoski. Buchkoski helps run some of the camps and runs the program at Freeman because he is the director. Freeman got involved with APX Strength because Freeman coaches wanted a program that would make their players better athletes.

"Buch is very serious, and is always looking out for you to make you a better athlete," Goldbach said.

Raul Vijil also works with APX and handles speed and agility. He comes around to Freeman once in awhile to help with drills and activities, and to cover when Buch is gone.

"APX has given us more stamina in the fourth quarter, more confidence, and less injuries," Wood commented.

With APX, the extent of injuries over the football season has amounted to a few sprained ankles and cramps.

"It helps baseball because it's not a weight bearing program," said Ripke, "The program is built around flexibility, using the muscle through a full range of motion, and the program also has a lot of sport specific movements. The program also emphasizes the core, which is very important for a baseball player,"

APX Strength's goal is to focus on the individual, and work to their specific needs. APX staff doesn't care about how much weight is on the rack, but they care about the work athletes are doing so that they can get stronger. Before APX, Freeman athletes would do the same workouts whenever they went to the weight room. With APX, athletes have more discipline and have a bet-

ter understanding of how to lift better.

"I run my weight classes as close to the APX as possible," Ripke said. "We do all the lifts that Buch and the summer guys do. Avery Smetana has been a big resource for me, as he has been going to see Buch down at the APX facility for the past 2 years now, and he brings back stuff that they are doing down there."

APX Strength's main facility is located on 203 E. Sprague Ave; they have programs and camps for football as well as baseball. APX also runs camps through schools at their weight rooms such as Freeman's. Anyone can participate in the camp at Freeman, and APX also offers a strength training program at Freeman designed for female athletes.

"I like how you can see how much stronger and more agile each kid is by the end of the summer," Phinney explained.

Freeman's summer APX camp begins on June 18, and an introductory camp on June 8 from 5pm till 8pm. APX has done well in strengthening Freeman's athletes and hopefully a state championship can come out of the hard work Freeman athletes have put in.

"It's a great program. A cutting edge one. One that everyone is just starting to figure out but we have a head start on," Phinney said.



"Coaches say there athletes need to be bigger, faster and stronger," explained health and fitness teacher Scott Carolan. "They're a fast way to get to that level of accomplishment."

The pressure and stress for this situation is incredibly high and can often lead to use of steroids.

"People hear the word scholarship and they go nuts," explained junior Wyatt Smith. "And for some reason kids just want to have huge muscles. That's every high school boy's dream."

Health Care Veda researched steroid usage and found that 5.4% of school students high were reported using steroids. These statistics are increasing at a quick rate. Today, people will do almost anything to look good. The society today makes people think that they need to look or be a certain way or look.

"Many kids resort to steroids as their ticket for a way out," said Carolan.

Magazines, TV, and movies often portray the good guys as the big and strong guys.

Steroids are an organic compound in groups of natural or synthetic fatty substances that contains four carbon rings that include sex hormones. They can be used for safe medical purposes, but can also be very harmful and lifealtering as well.

There are three types of steroids: anabolic, androgenic, and cortico. The Association Against Steroid Abuse said that anabolic steroids mainly affect metabolism, immunity and muscle. Androgenic steroids have masculinization effects on women and feminization ef-

fects on men. Cortico steroids mimic the hormone cortisone. It is used in regulating inflammation and healing injuries as well as treatment for diseases such as asthma, eczema, and arthritis.

Steroids have been proven to help for many reasons and can be used for good or medical purposes. The Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse showed that steroids can be used for treating some forms of anemia, some breast cancers, osteoporosis, endometriosis, and hereditary angiodema. They are used by many people, but must be used carefully and in small doses. Doctors pay close atten-

tion to the patients and the doses that they prescribe. Overuse can be fatal.

Not only are there physical effects on your body, but there is a mental aspect to steroid use as well.

"You may become high strung, tense, and may get uncontrollable, anger issues," explained Carolan.

Prevention. That's what high school athletics should be focused on. Staying on top of the issue and being aware of the issue is the most important thing. "Everybody just wants to be the biggest and best," added junior Cheyanna Bruneau.

The pressure on kids to be the biggest and best they can be is high and often too much for them to handle, so they turn to substances such as ster-

oids for help.

Steroids can help build muscle fast with the help of exercise. The affects can help enhance muscle, but can also be very damaging to the body. According to Global Change's issue on steroids, overuse can cause many types of cancer, heart disease, kidney cancer, liver cancer, depression, hostility, eating disorders, unwanted facial hair, acne, and the risk of HIV from unclean needles. I'm not saying underage drinking is a good thing; I'm actually trying to say the opposite. Drinking hurts you and others in more ways then just one.

Drinking can majorly affect your health. You could get really sick, or even get alcohol poisoning. Alcohol poisoning: Consequence of drinking large amounts of alcohol in a short period of time. According to mayoclinic.com, it can affect your breathing, heart rate, gag reflex and potentially, lead to coma or even death. It is like binge drinking, but worse. So what happens if you get alcohol poisoning? Lots of things. You can choke on your own vomit, have seizures, or end up at the hospital getting your stomach pumped. Wrong, it's still illegal! And if you get caught by law enforcement at a party the consequences are, well...not too good.

If you are at a place or party where there is alcohol and you are not drinking you can still be charged with a MIP. You don't have to be drinking to get in trouble; you just have to be there. It is guilt by association, and it sucks.

"We could arrest you," explained Nye. "But, we usually just write you a ticket for a minor in possession (MIP), or we could give you a juvenile referral, which still counts as an arrest."

And don't be selfish thinking

about how drinking affects just you. Because truth is, it doesn't, and that is something that not a lot of teenagers really think about. Because as soon as you get into a car it affects everyone around you. All you need is a blood alcohol content (BAC) level of .02 to get hauled in for driving under the influence (DUI).

"A BAC [Blood Alcohol Content] of .02 is nothing," Deputy Ron Nye explained. "You could only take a sip of a drink and still have a BAC of .02. Law enforcement agencies like to call it a baby DUI."

If you get caught driving with a BAC of .02, you lose your license for two years, or until you are 18, whichever one is longer. Also, your car gets impounded, you have to pay for the court fee, and pay for an attorney. Getting a DUI or getting caught at a party doesn't just affect your high school career; it affects your life after high school. Not a lot of colleges want students that are going to cause trouble, especially if they are breaking the law. Jobs will be more apprehensive to hire you, because they may think you are not responsible. Drinking affects your whole life.

So what does all this drinking information have to do with Freeman? Well if you are involved in athletics, a club or ASB, FHS has a policy about underage drinking. Freeman's athletic code is very strict. If you get caught drinking, the consequences are not too fun.

After the first violation, you are removed from the athletic team or club for duration of two weeks and will be required to attend an intervention program for alcohol/drug abuse. The student will be required to attend all practice sessions, but will not be allowed to participate in any contests during the probationary period.

After the second violation, the student is ineligible for interscholastic competition for a full calendar year.

After the third violation, the student is permanently ineligible for interscholastic competition for the remainder of his or her high school career.

This may not seem like a big deal, but trust me it sucks. You let your team down by not being able to play. People talk about what happened, and they think you are this big drinker. You are pretty much the hot gossip for a month, or two.

And you may think that going to those drug and alcohol classes on your first violation are just not big deal. I mean you go and sit there for a couple hours, listen to people telling you not to drink or do drugs, right? That my friend is so wrong. Those classes are actually pretty eye opening. You learn about your brain, and how adding drugs or alcohol affects you. You see images of someone's brain while they are under the influence compared to someone who is not.

How many teens drop out of school because of drugs and alcohol. But this class isn't just about drugs. The drinking part is really informative as well.

We watched a video of a mock crash, videos of Emergency Rooms where you see car crash victims, and see parents talk about their kids they lost to drunk driving. Wait, losing your child to a drunk driver... does that sound familiar?

Withdrawal increases throughout the country

Cries of infants fighting withdrawl pour out of hospital rooms across the nation.

"It's a very high-pitched, uncomfortable cry," said Dr. Aimee Bohn, a pediatrician with Mountain Comprehensive Health Corporation in Whitesburg, Kentucky. "It's like the child has been pinched."

According to The National Center for Biotechnology, Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome (NAS) is a group of problems that occur in a newborn who were exposed to addictive illegal or prescription drugs while in the mother's womb. The infants go through extreme pain and irritability. Hyperactive reflexes, rapid breathing, and seizures are just a few of the many symptoms accompanied with NAS. In-

fants of mothers who drink during pregnancy have a similar condition called Fetal Alcohol Syndrome. "Fetal alcohol syndrome varies widely from child to child based on the age of fe-

tal development that the alcohol was consumed. Some periods of brain development can end up more seriously affected" said Pricilla Custer, an adoptive parent with a child with FAS.

Daniel, her son, is now 15 and has been dealing with FAS his whole life. Each child will react differently and is hard to treat.

"You can't make broad generalizations," explained Custer. "But, some of the common effects [of FAS] are shortened stature, decreased fine motor skills. Behavioral issues and decreased IQ or mental retardation. It seems like abstract thinking is difficult, they have poor social skills and intuition."

Many difficulties arise in these situations. The whole family is all put under a new kind of stress not only the parents. Each age has a new difficulty, but once they reach the teenage years a whole new obstacle arrives

"These things seem to get worse in the teen years because of the increased demands of adolescence," added Custer. "They don't seem to be able to move forward."

Though in this type of situation things may seem really low there are so many lessons to be learned.

"Daniel has forced us to be other-centered," Custer explained. "We have learned to rejoice in small successes. We have learned to be flexible. How to forgive. You learn not to be proud. You trust in the Lord for hope. You get through it by starting fresh each day. You use whatever resource you can get, respite, excelsior, God."

Summer movie blockbusters are here!!







Jensen's actions and the way he talks to the other characters can influence



Now for the classes in the game that you can romp around as until you switch the one you play as. There are three groups of classes: offense, defense, and support.

Starting with the offensive side of the game is The Scout. He is the fastest class and the weakest in the game and uses scatterguns, pistols, and bats. He also is well known for the terms of Bonk! and Boink!

Next is The Soldier, the crazy man of the classes. Known for his patriotic glow, he carries a rocket launcher, shotgun, and a shovel. He can use his rocket launcher to rocket-jump across the map, but this could kill him if he doesn't have enough skill or health.


The last class of the offensive type is The Pyro, the mysterious one of the group. The Pyro's gender and identity has been battled over ever since the game was released, causing a massive amount of fan-fictions about The Pyro. The Pyro uses a flamethrower, shotgun, and a fire axe. Also, the fire from the flamethrower shows both cloaked and disguised Spies by catching them on fire, and a Pyro is immune to catching on fire.

Onto the defensive classes, starting with The Demoman, the more rambunctious of the nine classes that you can play as. The Demoman is the black, Scottish Cyclops of the group and has the most meleebased weapons that you can find and equip onto him. He uses a grenade launcher, a sticky grenade launcher, and a bottle of what he calls "Ole' Scrumpy" in his standard load-out.

Next, there is the morbidly obese class, The Heavy. The Heavy is the fat Russian that totes around a minigun, shotgun, and his own two fists into battle. He is the slowest and strongest, class in the game. Also, he can use sandwiches that he finds randomly or from achievements in order to heal others or himself. The sandwiches can also put out allies that are on fire.

Finally, there is The Engineer, the true Texan of the group of mercenaries. The Engineer carries a shotgun, pistol, wrench, and construction and deconstruction PDAs (Personal Data Assistants). He can make sentries, dispensers, and a pair of teleporters to aid his team and to make Engineer nests, a strategy that is useful in many situations.


The last category of characters is the support class, starting with The Medic. The Medic is from Germany and actually has lost his medical license before fighting for their teams. The Medic a syuses ringe gun that shoots



Next is The Sniper, the quiet Australian that hates spies with a passion. The Sniper camps around the map with a sniper rifle, an SMG (Sub Machine Gun), and a Kukri. Also, The Sniper can use Jarate, a jar that contains a yellow and warm liquid, that replaces the SMG and can be thrown to cause mini-crits (miniature critical hits on enemies) on enemies, show cloaked and disguised spies due to them exclaiming about how disgusting it was and that they are dripping with the fluid, and to put out allies that have been caught aflame by a Pyro.

The Sniper also is a fan favorite for his functionality, "...Because it gives great cover for teammates and allows me a good view of the battlefield," Sophomore Geoffrey Ruby stated.

Finally, there is The Spy, the Frenchman that has an affair with The Scout's mother and has a hatred of Pyros and Jarate. He uses a pistol, sapper, butterfly knife, disguise kit, and a watch that cloaks him. The sapper is used to destroy and disable all of The Engineer's buildings that are being sapped. Also,



The Spy's pistol is much different than the other class's pistols through design, and the firing rate, and the amount of ammunition carried in the gun and on The Spy.

Overall, the game is a team-oriented first-personshooter. Valve has thought of everything and even has you able to use a microphone to aid both teams. You can also press keys that allow you to use your class's voice to say things for you like to tell your team there is a sentry up ahead, or you can heckle your team. that they need to crush their opposition. In the store, there is even a \$100 item that acts as an engagement, yes a real life in-game proposal for an engagement, for people in-game and it announces, if someone accepted it, to all players that are online when the event happens.

Generally, the game was very good, but a few things sort of ruined the game and those things were minor.

First, the fact that if you are an FTP (Free To Play) player, you can't do certain things like trade with other players anything but item paints and tags for your items.

Second, there are people in the game that take part in an act called griefing, which basically is when you attempt to ruin the game play of everyone else in many ways from hacking the server to harassing other players, and I dislike this for it is annoying and a pain to deal with.

Third, other players can abuse the microphones. Luckily, this is counteracted by going to the pause menu and muting that player or you start a vote to remove the player from the game.

Fourth, your team can be spawn-camped, for instance, the enemy team can all go into The Heavy and Medic classes and trap you into spawn and keep your team from being able to get out of the spawn and they will be constantly killing people that attempt to leave the spawn and those that are in spawn. This practice is generally frowned upon.

Fifth, you can be dominated by another player if you get killed by them five times in a row, if you don't kill them in between those deaths, causing the game to announce your dominated status.

Sixth, the single player lags like crazy if you have about twenty Artificial Intelligences (AI's) playing, but the lag does subside over time.

Seventh, for some apparent reason, there are children playing this game. These kids are at least eight, maybe even twelve years old and they are playing an M-rated game that was rated for its violence-and-gore that is a major part of the game and they are playing with adults.

Finally, combined classes are generally balanced, minus the Heavy-Medic combination for, "... it can possibly use a nerf," Geoffrey Ruby explained. A nerf is another word for a downgrade.

But, those shallow cuts don't ruin the game's value. First, there are a multitude of maps and game types, including modified versions of games like the Versus Saxton Hale maps and Surfing maps.

Second, there is no true plot to the game, so you won't get too involved.

Third, there is a bountiful amount of internet memes, subjects and ideas that internet users use plenty to cause much humor that originated from or use parts of, the game. One such meme is the spy crab where you are a Spy choosing a disguise, crouching, and looking up.

Fourth, you can kill enemies with your taunts, depending on the weapons the classes are using.

Fifth, you also can dominate other players.

Sixth, there are items for pretty much all classes that reduce the amounts of Medics needed on a team.

Seventh, all griefers that are caught griefing or hacking are immediately or quickly kicked/banned from that server by their internet protocol address (IP).

Finally, a bit of a parallel to the part that was disliked, there are some people that use the microphones that abuse it with style and with funny things to say and or spam, making the part of microphones more of a preference.


What would you do if you had the instincts of a serial killer?

Is horseback riding a 'real' sport?

English riding is much more complicated than western, like the bridle for example.

Being humans, we tend to argue a lot. It seems that lately, we're arguing about what is a sport and what isn't. Horseback riding is one of the many sports we argue about. According to Dictionary.com, a sport is "an activity involving physical exertion and skill in which an individual or team competes."

"I think a sport is just anything that needs physical endurance, a uniform, and a scoring system," explained 7th grader Patricia Goldbach.

Horseback riding indeed has all of these. You need to be able to *stay* on the horse, which is harder than it looks. Also, if your leg (specifically calf) muscles aren't in shape, you can definitely pull something.

In horse shows, comappropriate boots are required, and so are helmets. You have a better chance at winning if you have the proper show clothes. For example, you must have the following to compete in English show jumping: long-sleeved blouse with a dark jacket over it, brown or green breeches, and tall boots that must be at your knee. You are required to wear a helmet, and have your hair pinned back.

These are the basic rules for 4H.

In shows, there is a scoring system! When competitors do something that impresses the judge, they get more points, and if the rider does something wrong, they will be deducted points. When a horse slows down, for example, the rider will get docked points. The score is different for jumping; when a rider knocks a pole, he or she gains points. In this event, you would want to get as close to zero as possible.

"Riding is indeed a sport!" claimed Shannon Moore, horse trainer and riding instructor. "Studies show that you can lose more calories trotting or cantering for 20 minutes than jogging for an hour!"

You can't just hop on the horse and expect them to go around those three

Horse shows can get extremely competitive. Almost every event is just for individuals to compete against one another at the 4H horse shows. The only average events that must have more than one rider are the competitive trail team, and drill team.


Back to the lead in lipstick, there was a test in 2007 conducted to see how many lipstick brands con-
