Seating: See the map below for the seating arrangements for the game:




Parking: Parking is available both above Roos Field (P12) and in front of Reese Court (P9, after 5:00 PM) and can be seen in the map below.



Guidelines for

REMOTE LEARNING



Per several emails in recent weeks from Freeman School District, we want to assure parents and students that we are prepared to move to remote learning for a brief duration **if necessary**. As stated in previous District emails, a move to remote is **NOT imminent**, but in the interest of trying to be as prepared as possible, we want to share some expectations should we need to move to remote as a last resort.

<u>Guiding Philosophy</u>: It is expected that any movement to remote learning will be brief in duration. Therefore, it is in the best interest of students and staff that this year's "re-established" routine remains intact so that any transition from in-person to remote or vice-versa is as smooth as possible.

<u>Guidelines</u>: If we move to remote learning, we want to replicate our typical day as closely as possible:

- Students are expected to attend their 6 class periods every single day of remote learning. If a student cannot attend class, a parent/guardian must phone the school office for the absence to be excused. Students with excused absences will be allowed to make up all missed work.
- Students are expected to attend virtual class appropriately dressed, sitting or standing, per typical operating procedures. Students are expected to attend with their cameras turned on; teachers may use the zoom "focus" feature to allow for student privacy in a remote setting.
- Students are expected to attend class on time per typical operating procedures. Students not on time to class will be marked tardy.
- Students are expected to complete and submit assignments by the assigned date per typical operating procedures.
- Teachers are expected to provide a meaningful online activity/lesson that <u>can</u> require synchronous learning for up to 40 minutes maximum per class period. It is understandable that some online activities/lessons may not require a full 40 minutes of synchronous learning; it is also understandable that some lessons may require increments of time for synchronous and asynchronous learning in the same period (ie: students start the lesson together online, are released to work at a skill on their own, and then are asked to return to meet as a group online before the end of the class period).

Advisory: potential check in with students on a rotation per day; potential office hours for all classes.

Help Kids Balance Their Media Lives



From phones and tablets to streaming movies and YouTube, tech and media are everywhere. Kids love easy access to TV shows, games, and information. Parents and caregivers love that kids can stay in contact while they explore their independence. But it's easy to overdo it when the phone never stops pinging and the next episode plays automatically. Families can keep media and tech use in check by following a few simple practices.

Create screen-free times and zones.

Help tweens and teens take breaks from tech by limiting screen time in bedrooms, during study time, or at the dinner table. Consider carving out regular family time when screens are either put away or enjoyed together.



Explore built-in digital well-being tools.

Together with your kids, check out the features on their devices and in their apps that can help them use tech more intentionally. Consider turning off autoplay functions, limiting notifications from certain apps, using settings that turn off devices at a certain time each night, and more.



Model the behavior you want to see.

Tweens and teens learn more from watching adult behavior than listening to lectures. Consider how you use your devices and other media, and make changes if your use doesn't follow your expectations for your kids.



Help kids identify healthy behaviors.

Ask kids to notice their feelings, both physical and emotional, during screen and non-screen activities. Does their heart rate increase when their phone vibrates? Does their self-esteem dip after viewing a friend's Instagram feed? Do they feel good when they get positive feedback on a post? Encourage kids to keep the constructive activities and let go of the rest.



Understand how tech companies make money.

Along with your tween and teen, research how digital devices, social media platforms, and apps and games get paid. Do they sell ads? Do they sell kids' data? Discuss why companies might want kids to spend more time on their platforms and what tricks they use to keep their attention.
