FARM Talk — Farm-fresh Eggs

- It is typical for farm-fresh eggs to be more rich in color (left, below), flavor and nutrients. (less cholesterol, less saturated fat, increased Vitamins A, E & D, more Omega 3 fatty acids, more beta carotene)
- Brown eggs are not different from white eggs, *except* in the color of their shells.

Egg Facts

- Store-bought eggs may be on the shelf for 30 days prior to purchase. \Rightarrow
- You may check freshness by floating eggs in water; fresh eggs don't float. As they break down and develop gases, it causes them to float.
- Eggs remain fresher when they are not washed because they are protected by a cuticle and "bloom" (a natural covering with antimicrobial properties)
- Chalazae are the white, spirally appearing fibers at each side of the yolk, which are the chords that assists in keeping a yolk centered inside the shell, so a developing chick will not become malformed as the hen incubates her brood.
- The yolk is the part of the egg that nourishes a developing chick, rendering it nutritious for consumption by humans too!
- Blood specks in eggs are caused by the rupture of a blood vessel on the surface \rightarrow during formation of the egg or by a similar accident in the wall of the oviduct. However, chemically and nutritionally, eggs with blood spots are fit to eat.
- You may color brown eggs, just as you do white eggs.

Natural Egg-coloring Options

- Red cabbage pretty blue Yellow onion skins warm gold
- Turmeric (or curry) also gold ("old gold" as we say in West Virginia)
- Chamomile tea pale yellow

Vocabulary — influence of poultry on language

mother hen: Hens are very protective of chicks. The expression has come to depict any behavior, usually regarding women, of "over-protection."

nest egg: Hens value their eggs since they represent future offspring. People refer to their "nest egg" as what they're setting aside for future cash-in.

pecking order: Chickens establish a "pecking order" of authority among the flock, which may change as new chickens are added. This order establishes who is in charge and who might get "picked" on. It is often compared to human behavior.

last one there is a rotten egg: A rotten egg is undesirable. The expression is used by children to urge each member of a group to get to their destination quickly.

running around like a chicken with its head cut off: An unpleasant visual that is a comparison to someone busily doing more than one thing at a time, often in a disorganized or uncontrolled manner or state of panic.

good/bad egg: Eggs in the nest for consumption may be "good or bad" for eating or good or bad (fertile, infertile or ceasing to develop properly) for propagation. Analogies have been made to people, often children, with regard to behavior.

hen party: Hens lock together and often cackle or "chatter" when they're together. This expression has been used to describe a group of ladies who gather together to talk.

brooding: Hens exhibit a specific behavior when they want to incubate their eggs rather than merely lay them and leave. A brooding hen will return to the nest repeatedly, even when removed, as though to be stuck or very focused on a task. People who over-focus on a matter are often described as brooding.

brood: A brood is the hen's clutch (collection of eggs) that she hatched. Though treated as "her offspring," a brood may result from eggs laid in a single nest by multiple hens. In language, a brood is the offspring of a parent.

rule the roost: One rooster will establish itself as the head of the flock, dominating the hens and other subordinate roosters. The term has been used for a person taking charge of a situation, whether invited or not.

henpecked: Hens show dominance over other hens by pecking them, and not allowing the other hens to exercise independence or experience peace. The term is analogized to depict women who criticize or give orders to their counterpart to an excessive extent. (synonymous with browbeaten, oppressed, etc.)

come home to roost: At the end of the day, chickens instinctually return to their chicken coop or roosting area (roosting is when they rest elevated on a branch or shelf to sleep for the night. People who come home to roost are thought to be returning to the comfort of home after a time away.

don't count your chickens before they hatch: Since the success of a brood of chickens to be fertile, incubate and then hatch is not always reliable, those who "count their chickens before they hatch" are unreliably counting on an outcome.

egg on your face: A relatively recent term acknowledging that an over-easy egg can make a mess without the consumer's awareness—being caught with "egg on your face" is used to convey someone who looks foolish or embarrassed by something unintended or initially believed to be concealed.
