

Graduation/Commencement — So, What Does all the Hoopla Mean? Vocabulary, Tradition, "Pomp & Circumstance"

For high school students, caps and gowns are basic in design. Tassels are approximately eight inches long with a six-inch loop. As students advance in their education, they will be subject to the protocol conveying the institution, degree and discipline they achieve.

The custom of wearing academic gowns, hoods and caps dates back to about the 12th century, when most scholars belonged to a religious order.

Long **gowns** and **hoods** were standard dress for medieval clergy, who often studied and taught in cold buildings. The style and coloring of the robe, hood and, sometimes, skull cap denoted an educated individual. From the end of the 16th century to the present, members of the clergy, law professionals and academics have worn **robes**.

Sometime in the 14th century, English universities began to use the dress to distinguish levels of education. Modeled on the English system, the American Academic Costume Code was established in 1895 by a commission of delegates from the Ivy League and New York universities.

The Costume Code calls for three types of gowns: **doctoral**, **master's**, and **bachelor's**. The doctoral gown is the most elaborate, with front-facing velvet and three velvet bars on each of the full, billowing sleeves. The velvet can be black, PhD blue, or the academic color to which the degree corresponds. The master's gown is distinctive for its

extremely long, closed sleeves, the arms protruding through a slit at the elbow. The bachelor's gown is the simplest of the three, a plain gown with long, pointed sleeves.

Doctoral and master's degrees are also indicated by a **hood** (worn around the neck and down the back, see below), distinctive in shape, size, and color. The doctor's hood is easily recognizable, with wide velvet edging that indicates the degree earned and full exposure of the lining. The master's hood is the same length as the doctor's hood but does not fully expose the lining, and the velvet edging is not as wide. For both hoods, the lining indicates the colors of the institution conferring the degree. (The colors including trimmings on gowns, edging of hoods and tassels of caps are unique based on the discipline completed.)

Mortarboards, the distinctive four-pointed **caps**, are worn by academics at all levels. In recent years, doctors have taken to wearing a soft velvet tam instead (see right).

Academic Levels of Achievement

Latin terms are used to recognize education accomplishments "with honor" or "with praise." They are sometimes called "Latin Honors." Criteria considered can be a final grade point average (of all classes on completion), class rank, number of hours completed, and academic records and achievements. Students graduating with honors usually are allowed to wear special insignia to indicate their achievement, such as an honor cord.

cum laude is typically bestowed on a graduate with a 3.5 GPA or higher. Academic institutions have specific, additional standards to achieve **summa cum laude** (with highest praise) and **magna cum laude** (with great praise), which may vary among the institutions—intended to identify only the top 1% or 2% of the graduating class. (Some institutions do not award summa cum laude, the highest of Latin honors.)

Memorial Day

History

Sometime during the late years of the Civil War (1861 – 1865), groups began decorating the graves of their loved ones who had died in battle. Depending on the source, there are perhaps over a dozen locations that claim to be the town

where the practice began being observed — the birthplace of Memorial Day. There is evidence that the tradition could have started in towns in either the North or the South. VA.gov states that on April 25, 1866, in Columbus, Mississippi, a local group of women went to decorate the graves of Confederate soldiers. They noticed barren graves of Union soldiers and decided to place flowers there in remembrance. Another site, usmemorialday.org, states that a hymn published in 1867 called "Kneel Where Our Loved Ones are Sleeping" carried a dedication "To the Ladies of the South who are Decorating the Graves of the Confederate Dead". Wikipedia says that by 1865 the practice was already widespread in the North. It is likely that the tradition began in many locations independently, with many variations on the same idea. Over time, as word spread, these traditions could have expanded from town to town.

In 1866, in a town in New York called Waterloo, a drugstore owner named Henry Welles suggested that the town shops close on May 5 to commemorate the soldiers buried at Waterloo Cemetery who had died during the Civil War. Two years later in Waterloo, on May 5, 1868, General John Logan issued a declaration that Decoration Day should be observed nationwide. The declaration said that May 30th would be designated as a day to decorate the graves of "comrades who died in defense of their country." According to History.com, President James Garfield gave a speech at Arlington National Cemetery on that day. In 1966, President Lyndon Johnson and the Congress of the United States stated that Waterloo was the official birthplace of Memorial Day, and the official date of origin was May 30, 1868.

In 1882, the name of the holiday was changed from Decoration Day to Memorial Day. After World War I, the holiday was expanded to remember soldiers from all American Wars. In 1971, Richard Nixon made Memorial Day a national holiday that was to be celebrated on the last Monday in May.


